Pastoral Team continued to care for our community. Our parish nurse, Donna Rutherford, provided care and education. Pam Wagner and Babs Miller donated many hours as did several of the pastoral care team.

The Educator Team was very excited to bring in Rev. Karen Gaudet to head up our children's programs. Art Rutherford, Tonya Hiland, Ann Glenn, Barbara McCarty and Rita Stephan worked very hard in between directors to keep the program going. Our summer Peace Camp was a success. Linda Rowold and the Bookstore team, Yvette Shelton and the library team provide books. "Theology in Everyday Life" continues to meet once a month. We hosted a "Jesus Seminar" and brought in the remarkable Deanna Duplechain to work with our youth.

We had nearly thirty people join this year. Bill Hornbuckle joined the staff to help us better care for our visitors. Virginia Marks and Bob Bartlett also continue as greeters on Sunday.

Providing Lessons in Living (Pastor Jim Rigby's sermons) beyond the hour of worship continues to be an important

labor of love for a growing group of dedicated persons at our church. First of all, we acknowledge the outstanding study and preparation of our own prophet/preacher, Jim Rigby, who, week to week, brings challenge, comfort, information and inspiration to us.

Then there is the consistent, competent recording of the sermons by a cadre of tech savvy individuals who have been quietly at work on this important task for years. There are 6-8 of these dedicated servants. You might catch a glimpse of one of them through the window of the sound room at the side of the sanctuary. At that point, the recorded sermon is made available to the Internet by David Marks, who posts it to our website, making it possible for St. Andrew's followers in places we might never dream of, to hear the sermon as it was delivered.

The Sermon Transcription Team then goes to work. Each week, one of this faithful group of seven works from a cassette tape or CD to transform the audio recordings into written documents, which then are placed in the circular brochure holder located in the church foyer, available in print form for congregation members to read, or perhaps share with the home-bound or other friends. This group has been functioning for approximately two years.

At the end of this season when we remember our blessings, let us lift up in gratitude the work of these, like many others at St. Andrew's, who regularly give of themselves in ministries intended to extend the witness of our church. And, if any of this work strikes a chord in you, please let your interest and willingness be known through our church office.

One definition of a miracle is “any amazing or wonderful occurrence”, and our Food Pantry ministry has experienced a good many of those kinds of miracles lately.

For example, in order to give out food bags at the Thanksgiving Feast, we spent well over half of the accumulated funds you have so generously donated. The following week, five people donated money in such large quantities, our coffers were almost replenished!

In recent times, the number of clients that come to the pantry has doubled and then tripled, yet somehow your giving has increased that much as well. Volunteers were asked to help with the pantry the day after Christmas. They cheerfully came and served with glad hearts. These volunteers included three teenagers! We always seem to have people who are willing to cook warm, nutritious food for the clients on the days the Food Pantry is open. More and more people are coming to the pantry who only speak Spanish. One of our newest volunteers is fluent in Spanish and has been invaluable in this area.

You see? Miracles! However, we do have some special requests for a few more miraculous things. We are in need of volunteers who can work on Jan. 9 and 23. Please sign up for those empty slots at the white board by the Greeters’ Table. Also, for at least the next six months, we need volunteers who are willing to donate eggs, bread or milk once every three months or so. As far as replenishing our pantry, we can always use peanut butter, jelly, boxed juices, cereal, spaghetti sauce, canned black and pinto beans, canned pasta, and canned meats.

Winter/Spring 2010 Film Series “The Century of the Self” How business and politicians create and manipulate mass-consumer society. Originally aired on the BBC. bbc.co.uk/bbcfour/documentaries/features/century_of_the_self.shtml

Adam Curtis’ acclaimed series tells the story of the growth of the mass-consumer society in Britain and the United States. How was the all-consuming self created, by whom, and in whose interests? At the heart of the story is Sigmund Freud, whose techniques to probe the unconscious mind provided tools for understanding the secret desires of the masses and served as the precursor to a world full of political spin doctors, marketing moguls, and society’s belief that the pursuit of satisfaction and happiness is the ultimate goal.

Jan. 10, Part One: Happiness Machines

The story of the relationship between Sigmund Freud and his American nephew, Edward Bernays, who invented the public relations profession in the 1920s and was the first person to use Freud’s ideas to manipulate the masses.

Feb. 7, Part Two: The Engineering of Consent

How the U.S. government (including the CIA) and big business in post-WWII America used Freud’s ideas about the unconscious mind to try and control the masses, arguing that deep within all human beings were dangerous and irrational desires and fears.

Mar. 14, Part Three: There is a Policeman Inside All Our Heads: He Must Be Destroyed

The story of self-help movements and the rise of the expressive self -- the Me Generation -- and how American corporations soon realized that this new self was not a threat but their greatest opportunity.

Apr. 11, Part Four: Eight People Sipping Wine in Kettering

How liberal politicians such as Bill Clinton and Tony Blair turned to the techniques developed by business to read and fulfill the inner desires of the self, claiming to create a new and better form of democracy, one that truly responded to the inner feelings of the individual.

All screenings are on Sundays at 12:15 following the 10:45 worship service. The films are one hour, followed by discussion.

The Giving Tree

Thank you to all who made the Christmas Giving Tree an incredible success. It was an immense joy this holiday season to watch ornaments disappear from the tree, have a room full of gifts come back in, see the looks on children's faces when a huge box of gifts arrived, and witness the incredible response to the need for electricity support.

This Christmas season, the St. Andrew's Giving Tree helped 24 different families, predominantly from the Workers Defense Project. These are families suffering because of unfair employer practices like wage withholding, benefit denial, and workmen's compensation denial. Gifts were given for 62 children ranging in age from a few months to seventeen years. Electric payments of \$110 or more were made for 9 families from the WDP in immediate need to keep the power on and gave a \$50 HEB gift card to each of these 9 families. The other 11 families identified by WDP each received at least \$80 and HEB gift cards with their presents. Four families from Wells Branch Elementary receive \$50 HEB gift cards and gifts. In all, \$2,640 and many gifts were donated.

The level of support provided truly speaks for itself, but I want to share three experiences that stand out for me. The first occurred the Sunday before Christmas after I told the congregation about the immediate needs for power for two additional families from WDP. Your response was overwhelming. I had the joy of making electrical payments for those families. I literally had to sit down just to breath and take in the overwhelming generosity.

The second occurred the first evening that families had scheduled to pick up gifts. A young woman who came with two of her children in tow said, "You have no idea how much this means to us. I've made it on my own for nine years, but I just couldn't this year, and I didn't think we would have Christmas. We will pay-it-forward next year when things are better for us again. Bless all of you."

And the last occurred taking a delivery out to a small house in Taylor where we were greeted at the door by a nine year old girl and her four year old brother who simply stared at the box absolutely speechless until we had started down the steps, when the four year old called out "Merry Christmas."

In addition to thanking all of you for the Giving Tree donations, my many thanks also extend to those who helped with organizing and making deliveries. I was especially grateful to Steve, Leticia, and Elvia for coordination help when my high school Spanish failed, to Diane for always keeping me updated and on track, to Emily and Cristina who coordinated for WDP. Thanks to all at St. Andrew's for your beautiful outpouring for these families.
